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President's Address:

January 2026 is likely to be remembered for its rain fall and storms. Political storms emanated from the White House, of the presidential variety. More conventional storms, supercharged by the effects of climate change, emanated from the Atlantic. While it might be beyond the gift of sensible Consulting Engineers to deal with the White House storms, helping our nation deal with the other storms is part of our *raison d'être* as and our importance to society is elevated with each gust of wind that blows and every rain drop that falls.

We are the profession with the skills to help the people of the world deal with the impacts of ever more threatening weather events, through weather resilient infrastructure design. Others can talk about it, but it is us Engineers that can do something about it!

To enable us carry out this work most effectively, I wish to return to one of my key presidential themes – improving the "Business of Consulting Engineering" and enhancing our value proposition.

In that regard, I recently attended an event where the speaker set out some principles upon which Chartered Accountants maximize "reward" from their business activities. I got six key take aways that I would like to share with you all:

Chartered Accountants offer more than just technical advice to their clients (being technically excellent is a given).

Their mantra is "I am a business adviser and I have expertise in accountancy". Skills are thus intentionally developed around being a business adviser, such as leadership/soft skills, which make them more valuable to their clients. Hence, "value add" is key to business reward for their profession.

They have a strong professional body and being a Chartered Accountant with that body is an utter must for credibility and status.

Professional "credibility" is key to the success of the profession.

Accountants seek out leadership roles in the wider economy and broader society

"Visibility" of the profession, away from the day job, is essential to build their brand.

They get close to high powered decision makers, routinely talk to politicians and become their trusted advisers.

This enables them to regularly "Influence" key decision makers.

Chartered Accountants are militant at furthering their education/training/skillsets. Additionally, they invest in key industry spokespeople so they can sell their message in all forums.

These may be individual firm or industry representatives, but their message benefits the profession always.

They get in early with clients on business transactions. Then they try to become the ones organizing all others.

The closest party to the client is the one with the greatest influence and hence earning power.

I hope you all find the above points of value and worth reflecting on for your firm and by extension our profession of Consulting Engineering. I think the message in a nutshell turns the advice a former boss gave me on its head, when it comes to our work. He used say "don't tell me, show me".

As Consulting Engineers we are experts at showing how things work. But we have fallen down on talking about it, and the perceived value of our work has been is not widely understood by the masses. So to mimic more closely the success of Chartered Accountants at maximizing their value, we need more of "don't just show me, tell me".....
